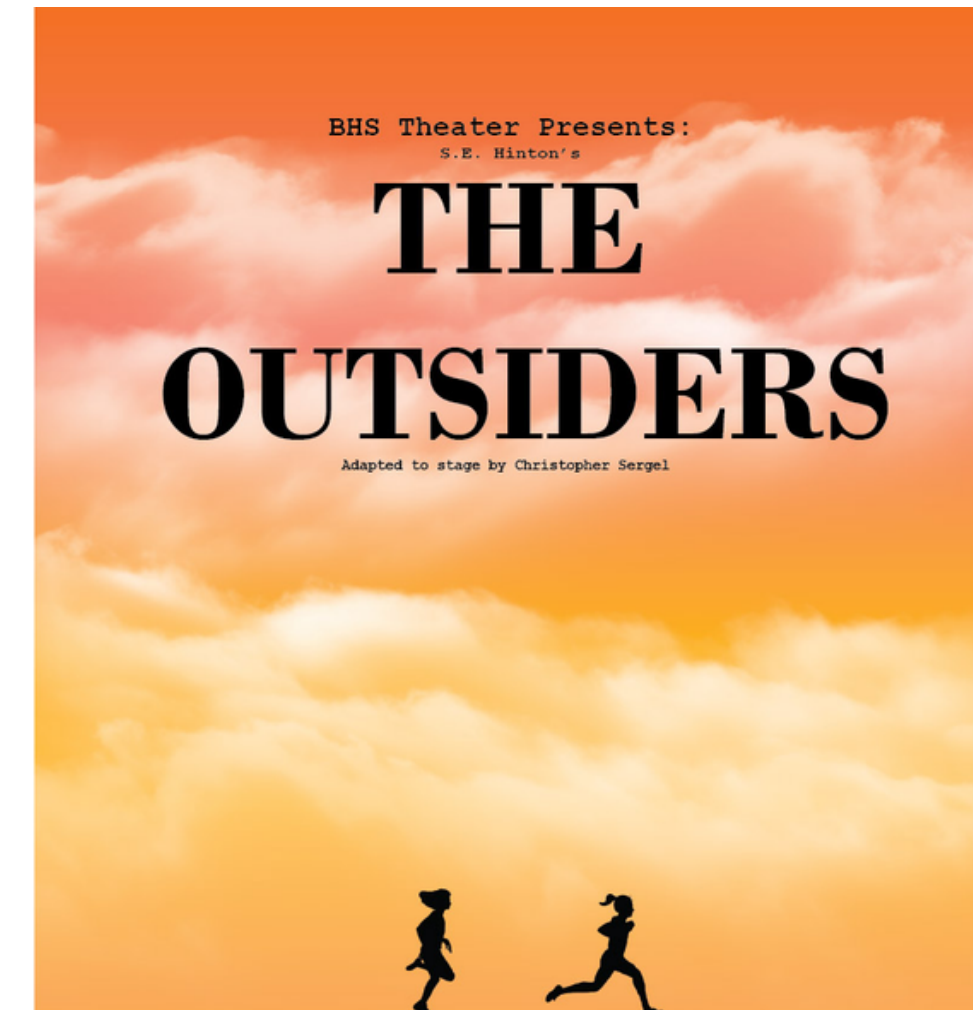

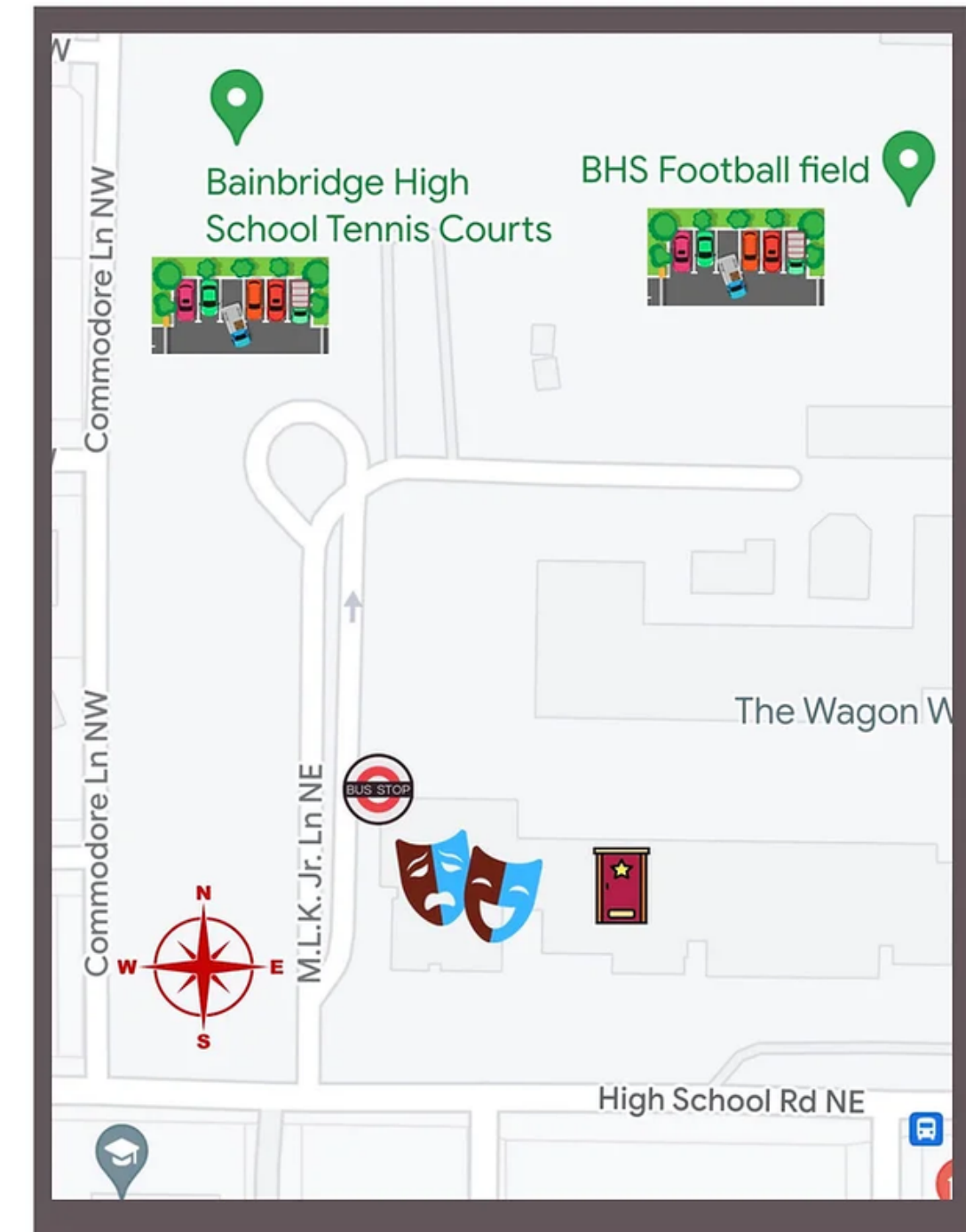


Introduction

Going to the theater is an exciting and special experience. It's a place where you can watch incredible performances, immerse yourself in storytelling, and be part of a community of theater enthusiasts. This social narrative will guide you through the process of visiting Bainbridge High School Theater to watch *The Outsiders* and provide helpful information to make your experience smooth and enjoyable.

Entrance

You will go through the front doors to enter the theater. There will be someone at a table inside of the entrance who will scan your ticket or look up your tickets if you do not have yours with you.

You will proceed to the next set of doors and wait outside of the auditorium until the theater doors open.



While waiting for the theater doors to open, you can explore the lobby area. If needed, take this time to use the restroom. Keep in mind that the lobby might be crowded and noisy.



Theater Doors

You will enter the theatre doors to get to your seat in the auditorium. These doors will typically remain closed until 30 minutes before the performance start time.

A staff member will be outside of the theater door and will hand you a show program on your way in.



Inside the Theater

Once inside the theater, you and the other guests will be able to choose your seats. Note that seats are first come first serve.

Enjoying the Show

As you find your seat, take a moment to settle in and get comfortable. Ensure that your phone is on silent or turned off to avoid any distractions. Before the show begins, it's common for people to engage in conversations, so it might be noisy in the theater. The lights will dim to signal the beginning of the show.

Enjoy the talents of the actors, the beautiful sets, and the captivating story unfolding before you. Feel free to express your emotions and reactions, whether it's clapping, laughing, or even crying.

Intermission

During the performances, there will be an intermission, which is a break in the show. Most intermissions will be 15-20 minutes long. Take this time to use the restroom or stretch your legs.

After the Show

At the end of the show or during an intermission, you will exit the theatre the same way you came in. There will be staff along the way to guide you if you need assistance.

Because everyone will be leaving at the same time, there might be a line and crowding.

Before you exit the theater, the cast will be lined up. Feel free to tell them good job! You can leave whenever you are ready.

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
